Kenya Crumel directs the Black Land & Power initiative at the National Black Food & Justice Alliance (NBFJA), a coalition of Black-led food justice organizations and farmers working collectively towards Black food sovereignty and land justice. Working in partnership to remove 15 million acres of land from the speculative market, Kenya along with a council of NBFJA members, piloted the Resource Commons in 2023 to provide non-extractive capital to Black farmers to secure land and equipment or build infrastructure.

Eric Sheffer: Eric Sheffer Eric Sheffer is a 6th generation owner/operator of Sheffers Grassland Dairy LLC, a 225 cow organic dairy in Hoosick Falls, New York. After returning home from college, Eric invested in his family's farm by turning the existing dairy replacement rearing operation back into a dairy. In 2008, the Sheffers began milking 100 cows on grass conventionally, and over the course of six years grew the farm up to 250 cows. At this point, because of market signals and growth limitations, Eric began converting the farm over to an organic dairy. In 2017, Sheffer's Grassland Dairy was officially an organic dairy and it has shipped to Stonyfield Organic since. Eric, his wife Jillian, and son Jackson, are proud sixth and seventh generation owners of the dairy and stay very active in agriculture. Eric currently serves as the vice president of the Northeast Organic Dairy Producers Alliance, as well as the board president for the Dairy Grazing Apprenticeship.



Robert Chang: RRobert Chang is Director of Policy, Co-Director with NEFOC Land Trust. He is an immigrant of Jamaican and Chinese descent. He grows certified organic vegetables and cut flowers at Echo Farm in occupied Wabaquasset Nipmuc territory now known as Woodstock CT. He is a founding member of the New CT Farmer Alliance and the Southern New England Farmers of Color Collaborative. After a career outside of agriculture, he looks forward to continuing work to build community, power and prosperity among farmers in the region.





Tracy Lerman is GrowNYC's Assistant Director for Regional Agriculture. In this role, she heads up GrowNYC's Farmer Assistance team, which provides training and technical assistance to growers who aspire to or currently sell at GrowNYC's Greenmarkets, their network of more than 55 farmers markets around New York City. Prior to her work with GrowNYC, she was the Executive Director of the Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Working Group (NESAWG), a 12-state, multi-sector network of farm and food practitioners working to strengthen the movement for a just and sustainable food system. She has a master's degree in Community Development from the University of California Davis where her research examined the efficacy of various marketing strategies purported to help small and midsized sustainable growers be more profitable. She lives in Kingston, NY, with her husband, an organic farmer and beekeeper, young daughter, and dog.

Mrs. Barker is a co-founder of Operation Spring Plant, Inc. She currently serves as the Executive Director, where she has been actively involved in all OSP programs and has been a major contributor in each of the organizational accomplishments.





Irene Ruiz s the daughter of Mexican Immigrants, she grew up in Hazelton, ID where she also worked in the fields with her family. She received her Master of Arts in Hispanic Studies at the University of Illinois at Chicago and her Bachelor of Arts in Spanish from Boise State University. Irene currently lives in Boise, ID. Irene has been an activist for over 20 years. She currently works for the Idaho Organization of Resource Councils. She is a board member for the ACLU of Idaho the Stay at School Quinceñera program, and Indigenous Idaho Alliance. Irene also co-founded and organized a coalition of 10 non-profit organizations to support the Latinx, immigrant, and farm-working community called the Idaho Immigrant Resource Alliance (IIRA) that started in 2020 to support those communities around climate change. IIRA won the 2022 Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs for their work.

Irene was selected as one of 28 women to be a part of the U.S. Grassroots Accelerator Program from the Women's Earth Alliance in 2022 which will support her work on environmental justice while building alliances with other powerful leaders working to protect the environment. Irene is a Resilience in Climate Equity Award (RICE) winner, an award given to Women and Femmes of Color doing expectational work in climate justice. Irene has won the 2024 Robert Bullard Environmental Justice Award from the Sierra Club.

Toni Stanger-McLaughlin

Toni Stanger-McLaughlin J.D., a citizen of the Colville Confederated Tribes, serves as the Chief Executive Office (CEO) of the Native American Agriculture Fund (NAAF). Mrs. Stanger-McLaughlin has compassionately worked in agriculture law and policy for many years. Before being named the CEO of NAAF, she served as the first NAAF Director of Programs where she assisted the development and delivery of millions of dollars of NAAF philanthropic investment in Tribal food systems.

started her agricultural career working in the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) headquarters in Washington D.C., within the Office of Civil Rights. She was engaged in the settlement of civil rights and access to credit claims on behalf of American Indian farmers and ranchers in the Keepseagle national class action litigation; the settlement of those claims ultimately led to the creation of NAAF. Mrs. Stanger-McLaughlin thereafter moved from the Office of Civil Rights to the USDA Office of Tribal Relations in the Office of the Secretary.

While in the Office of Tribal Relations, Toni working across multiple USDA agencies and offices as well as other federal departments to advance Tribal needs in agriculture, natural resources, land use and infrastructure development. A key highlight in her time at USDA included leadership in a comprehensive analysis of the policies related to sacred sites for the U.S. Forest Service. Upon leaving USDA, Toni established a successful consulting business working directly with Tribes for five years.

Prior to joining NAAF, Toni served as the Director of Tribal Relations for the University of Arkansas School of Law Indigenous Food and Agriculture Initiative (IFAI). At IFAI, Toni worked with individual producers and Tribal governments advancing their needs in agriculture and in self-governance in the area of food law and policy. Her work also included providing training directly to Tribal producers and food businesses. She attended the University of North Dakota School of Law and received her JD, focusing on federal Indian law. In addition, Mrs. Stanger-McLaughlin holds certificates in mediation, Tribal law and business, as well as executive leadership. In her spare time, Toni enjoys being outdoors with her husband and three children, as well as beading and sewing powwow regalia for her immediate and extended family.

Maurice Mitchell is a nationally recognized political strategist and visionary leader in the Movement for Black Lives. Raised by Caribbean working-class parents, he began organizing as a teenager and never stopped. After working for several grassroots advocacy organizations in his home state, Maurice directed the NY State Civic Engagement Table. In the wake of the police murder of Mike Brown, he relocated to Ferguson and helped build the Movement for Black Lives. He went on to co-found and lead Blackbird, a movement anchor organization, and was a key organizer of the Movement for Black Lives convention in Cleveland in 2015. In 2018, Maurice took the helm of the Working Families Party where he is applying his passion and experience to make WFP the political home for a multi-racial working-class movement.
